CIP Budget FY2016

Enclosed, please find the spreadsheet summarizing the proposed Capital Budget after the Town Manager's review. I've also enclosed a copy of the advertisement (notice) for the Capital Budget ("CIP"). The Budget Board's report is included.

The spreadsheet tracks the departmental/original requests, the Budget Board's actions and the Town Manager's recommendations. This is a comprehensive plan that includes all CIP spending regardless of the revenue source, so it will show higher spending than the amount recommend from tax revenue. It comprises the FY2016 (one year) recommendation and includes a projected 5 year (total) program.

The order in my report tracks, as close as possible, the order the items are listed in the spreadsheet.

Departmental Highlights

General Administration

LED Lighting \$12,000

Upgrading street lights and lights on municipal property to LED.

Website Upgrade \$8,000

The Town's primary website has outdated architecture and platforms that are not easy to use. As such, the ability to work within the website and access it remotely is difficult or non-existent. The existing system is fourteen (14) years old. This project will upgrade the website to improve its capabilities and functionality. It will be more user friendly, more functional and can be accessed easier by mobile devices.

Recreation Office

Natural Gas conversion of Parks& Recreation building

\$8,000

The Council has already approved the conversion of the Parks and Recreation building on North Main Street to natural gas.

Jesse M. Smith Memorial Library

Nothing for FY2016, but the building will need general maintenance in the coming years, including work on the roof.

Town Clerk

Projects from the Clerk's technology fund will be advanced separately during the course of the fiscal year, if requested.

Technology Upgrades & Preservation

We shifted from laptops to tablets for use by Council and Administration.

Continued use of the laptops if that is a preference will still be supported, but we'd eventually like to standardize the devices we support going forward.

Finance

OPEB – Biennial Actuarial Report

\$10,000

Statistical Revaluation

\$0

The Council has already appropriated funds for this State mandated project (\$140,000). This is required every three (3) years.

TransCanada appraisal & professional services

\$30,000

This primarily covers appraisal(s), but we do use it for some legal, professional services and ancillary expenses.

Information Services

Communications/computer software & hardware

\$10,000

Software licenses

\$12,600

The software licenses for many of our computers have expired or will be expiring soon and must be reissued.

Parks and Recreation

Land acquisition

TBD

Acquisition of the "Swift" property, needed for potential expansion of the Beckwith Lodge and to construct new recreational fields is currently being finalized. Future planning for this site will be forthcoming as time and finances dictate.

Spring Lake

Beach recreation equipment – from Spring Lake Reserve Fund

\$16,000

To purchase equipment to create a children's recreation area e.g.: slides, boats and safety related items.

Spring Lake Beach storage and ancillary use building

\$350,000

The Council has already authorized design and permitting for demolition and replacement of this facility (Brown House).

The project schedule calls for one last season using the existing building while DEM and other permitting is pursued. After design of the proposed new facility is approved by the Council, demolition will take place after the 2015 season. Construction is planned to take place as weather permits in 2015 and 2016, with a target completion date when the beach opens in 2016.

Police Department

Vehicles – 4 X 4 patrol vehicle (2)

\$66,000

Two (2) patrol vehicles are recommended. The Budget Board wants to fund a third vehicle from the Operating Budget.

Body armor (contractual)

Records storage system

\$6,155

Public Works Vehicles/Equipment

23,500 GVW Dump/Plow Truck with accessories. Two (2) @ \$98,000

\$196,000

The Public Works Director requested that we purchase two (2) smaller 23,500 lb. GVW dump/plow trucks rather than one (1) large 41,000 lb. GVW truck. These vehicles are more versatile. Although the larger truck will eventually be needed, purchasing it can wait a year or two, depending on the condition of similar size trucks in the fleet.

Sewer

Costs of the bond issue for plant upgrades are included over the next two (2) fiscal years.

\$1,300,000

The Council has already approved the borrowing needed to upgrade the Sewer Treatment Plant. The majority of the upgrades are mandated by Federal and State laws, regulations, etc. The State's Clean Water Finance Agency is the funding agency.

Building projects – Five (5) Year RIDE CIP

\$226,394

Schedule as voted by the Town Council is as follows:

RIDE - School 5 Year Capital Infrastructure Funding Plan - \$3,420,326

A bond issue for November 2016 was discussed as part of this plan. Details will need to be worked out so that legislation can be sought. The amount of the potential bond is \$3,286,331 (\$3,300,000) based on information provided by the School Administration.

Infrastructure/Road Projects for FY2016

The Lake Shore Drive project drainage design and permitting is underway. We have split the project into two (2) phases. We will be doing permitting, easements (legal work) and construction of the drainage system in FY2016 and the road improvements in FY2017. Jeff estimates the drainage work, etc. to be \$200,000. The road work is shown as standby projects but should be done in FY2017.

The next three (3) pages (charts) summarize the road/infrastructure/capital projects as recommended.

Chart A shows work already approved in various stages of completion.

<u>Chart B</u> shows work and projects to be undertaken in FY2016 (this budget). The only major road/infrastructure project is drainage in the Lake Shore Drive neighborhood. Paving these roads will be scheduled after the drainage projects are completed, which is projected to take us well into FY2016.

<u>Chart C</u> projects placed on standby or to be deferred. These projects are listed in priority order and could be done if funds from other projects allow.

<u>Please note:</u> Changes the Council makes will be charged or added to the major capital appropriation. As an example, if the Council adds an all-wheel police patrol vehicle, the transfer to major capital line will be reduced by that amount. If the Council cuts or reduces any of the recommendations, the major capital transfer line will increase dollar for dollar.

Funds that may be needed for the TransCanada litigation should be reserved and transferred into the Debt Reduction Fund at fiscal year-end.
