- WHEREAS, the Burrillville Wastewater Treatment Facility was presented the Environmental Protection Agency's 2023 Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Operation & Maintenance Excellence Award for Rhode Island; and
- WHEREAS, the Burrillville Wastewater Treatment Facility was nominated by Region 1 of the Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management and was only one of three facilities to receive this award; and
- WHEREAS, this award was created to identify and honor publicly owned wastewater treatment plants and their employees committed to improving water quality and maintaining exceptional operations; and
- WHEREAS, led by Michael Emond, Superintendent, and the five member Burrillville Sewer Commission, the facility serves over 9,000 customers while treating approximately 0.83 million gallons of water per day; and
- WHEREAS, the Burrillville Wastewater Treatment Facility has had many years of excellence including 2015 when it was recognized with the Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Excellence Award; and
- WHEREAS, even with challenges in the last year including shutdowns and a statewide sludge disposal issue, Superintendent Michael Emond was proactive in making sure the plant was a priority in resolving these concerns; and
- WHEREAS, on Wednesday January 24, 2024 Michael Emond, Superintendent and William Andrews, Chair of the Burrillville Sewer Commission received the award at the New England Water Environment Association Conference held in Boston, Massachusetts; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we, the Town Council of the Town of Burrillville on this 27<sup>th</sup> day of March, 2024 congratulate Michael Emond, the Burrillville Sewer Commission members and the facility's employees on being the recipient of the 2023 Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Operation & Maintenance Excellence Award for Rhode Island.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we, the Town Council do hereby honor the Burrillville Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Burrillville Sewer Commission for their continued commitment to excellence for the Burrillville community.

24-090 Presentation by the Burrillville Prevention Action Coalition Coordinator Monica Blanchette and Burrillville Addiction Assistance Program Coordinator Brandy Bates to update the Council on the status of their programs.

Discussion: Monica Blanchette, Burrillville Prevention Action Coalition Coordinator, and Brandy Bates, Burrillville Addiction Assistance Program Coordinator, gave a presentation of services and programs. A summary is on file with the record of this meeting.

There was no action taken on this item.

24-091 Presentation from Beth Ullucci, Library Director; Monica Blanchette, BPAC Coordinator; and the Boys and Girls Club of Northern Rhode Island to provide an update on Burrillville's Learn365RI grant.

Discussion: Beth Ullucci, Library Director, and Monica Blanchette, Burrillville Prevention Action Coalition Coordinator, spoke about the programs offered through the Learn365 RI grant. They've geared this grant towards STEM (science, technology, education, mathematics) programs. They discussed opening up BEC (Burrillville Extended Care) to students with low school attendance so they can get extra tutoring, the afterschool and summer robotics camps, a trip to the Boys & Girls Club, ELA (English language arts) tutors to help with "Summer slide," and other programs.

Mike Kenyon, from the Boys & Girls Club of Northern RI, discussed the ISL (integrated service learning) platform being used at the Boys & Girls Club that is available to Burrillville students with the Learn365 RI grant.

There was no action taken on this item.

24-092 First reading of proposed amendments to the Revised General Ordinances of the Town of Burrillville, RI, 2004, as amended, Chapter 4 entitled *Animals* and Chapter 11 entitled *Courts*; and consider scheduling a public hearing.

VOTED to schedule a public hearing at the call of the chair.

Motion by Councilor Dennis M. Anderson. The motion carried unanimously by the six members present.

24-093 Consider and act on a recommendation from the Ordinance Subcommittee regarding updates to the Sick Leave Policy for Department Heads and Non Union Administrative Staff; or take any other action thereon.

VOTED to approve the Sick Leave Policy for Department Heads and Non Union Administrative Staff.

Motion by Councilor David Houle. The motion carried unanimously by the six members present.

24-094 Consider and act on proposed amendments to the Revised General Ordinances of the Town of Burrillville, RI, 2004, as amended, *Sec. 8-55 Class B and C license rules* in response to the recently passed Outdoor Dining Act; or take any other action thereon.

VOTED to refer to the Ordinance Subcommittee.

Motion by Councilor Raymond J. Trinque. The motion carried unanimously by the six members present.

24-095 Consider and act on a request from Councilor David Houle to rescind the vote taken on February 14, 2024 to refer his request for amendments to Sec. 2-26 Conduct of town council meetings to the Ordinance Subcommittee; or take any other action thereon.

Discussion: Councilor David Houle stated that after careful review of the ordinance as it is currently written, he is confident that there are already provisions in place for time limits to be given on a case by case basis as determined by the Town Council President.

VOTED to rescind the vote taken on item #24-031 on February 14, 2024, to refer the request for amendment of §2-26 Conduct of town council meetings of the Burrillville ordinances to add a time limit for public comment to the Ordinance Subcommittee.

Motion by Councilor Raymond J. Trinque. The motion carried unanimously by the six members present.

24-096 Consider and act on a request to enter into an access and use agreement to provide access to Pascoag Dam; or take any other action thereon.

Discussion: Michael C. Wood, Town Manager, explained that this would give access to the Pascoag Dam for maintenance or make any repairs if needed. There is no access otherwise, it's surrounded by private properties.

VOTED to authorize the Town Manager or DPW Director to enter into an access and use agreement with Kathleen and Bradford Provencal; and authorize the funds not to exceed \$2,370 for the agreement to be taken from the contingency line in the Restricted fund (fund #0130).

Motion by Councilor Dennis M. Anderson. The motion carried unanimously by the six members present.

24-097 Consider and act on a request from Michael C. Wood, Town Manager, to consider options for the Juneteenth holiday; or take any other action thereon.

Discussion: Michael C. Wood, Town Manager, stated that although Juneteenth is a State holiday and it is now in the Council 94 union contract, it's not yet a holiday we would close the Town buildings for. The matter was discussed.

VOTED to consider Juneteenth an official holiday and close Town buildings for all non-essential services.

Motion by Councilor Raymond J. Trinque. The motion carried unanimously by the six members present.

VOTED to draft a letter of support and an identical resolution from the Town Council

## Burrillville Town Council Resolution Funding Formula

#### **SECTION I**

WHEREAS, In 2011, Rhode Island implemented a Foundation-based Funding Formula. The new Formula followed years of arbitrary education funding. A key element of the Formula is the Core Instructional Amount (CIA). The CIA funds essential education costs required by Rhode Island's Basic Education Program. The CIA is calculated using average expenditure and enrollment data from Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New Hampshire. Under current law, the CIA will, in FY 2025, increase to \$12,617, a 6.2% increase. The Governor's proposed FY 2025 budget would index CIA funding to the Consumer Price Index and cap it to a 3.7% increase, or \$12,335. As a result, local education agencies would realize a \$26 million reduction in formula aid, and Rhode Island's per pupil expenditure average would fall further behind the other New England states.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Council of the Town of Burrillville urges the members of the General Assembly to maintain CIA funding at the existing level for FY 2025 and beyond.

#### **SECTION II**

WHEREAS, In FY2024, the Rhode Island General Assembly increased the categorical funding for Multi Language Learners (MLL) from 10% of the CIA to 15%, increasing funding to \$20 million, and also directed the Rhode Island Department of Education (RIDE) to develop objective benchmarks consistent with the WIDA consortium for determining student English proficiency by October I, 2023; and

WHEREAS, Heretofore, RIDE has yet to develop WIDA-compliant benchmarks.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Council of the Town of Burrillville urges the Council on Elementary and Secondary Education to direct RIDE staff to develop English proficiency benchmarks as soon as possible.

#### SECTION III

WHEREAS, The Rhode Island General Assembly increased the High-Cost Special Education categorical fund to \$15 million by lowering the reimbursement threshold from five times the CIA plus the student success factor to four times. And reduce it to three times the CIA would provide an additional \$25 million to LEAs to meet this critical need.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Council of the Town of Burrillville urges the members of the General Assembly to lower the High-Cost Special Education categorical fund to 3% and provide full funding in the future.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forward to the Honorable Daniel J. McKee, Governor of the State of Rhode Island; the Honorable K. Joseph Shekarchi, Speaker of the Rhode Island House of Representatives; the Honorable Dominick J. Ruggerio, President of the Rhode Island Senate; and the Council on Elementary and Secondary Education.

Adopted this 27th day of March 2024.

VOTED to adopt a resolution in support of the Municipal Road Fund in the State's FY2025 budget.

WHEREAS, the Town of Burrillville supports any allocation of funds directed towards municipalities, particularly the Municipal Road Fund that Governor Daniel J. McKee has presented in his FY2025 budget; and

- WHEREAS, the infusion of state funds specifically earmarked for road improvement projects would provide a significant boost to the Town of Burrillville's efforts in enhancing the quality and safety of our roadways; and
- WHEREAS, despite our best efforts, the challenges of sustaining and improving our road infrastructure persists, with additional financial support from the State we would be able to implement more comprehensive maintenance and replacement intiatives.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Council of the Town of Burrillville urges the House Finance Subcommittee on Environment and Transportation to consider allocating funds for the Municipal Road Fund as outlined in Governor Danield J. McKee's FY2025 budget.

Adopted this 27th day of March 2024.

24-101 Consider and act on adopting a resolution opposing House Bill 2024 – H 7763 Relating to Public Records – Access to Public Records Act; or take any other action thereon.

Discussion: It was discussed that there is a Senate version of this legislation, Senate Bill 2024 – S 2679, and the Town Council should include that bill in the resolution for opposition.

VOTED to adopt a resolution opposing House Bill 2024 – H 7763 and Senate Bill 2024 – S 2679 Relating to Public Records – Access to Public Records Act.

Motion by Councilor Dennis M. Anderson. The motion carried unanimously by the six members present.

- WHEREAS, legislation has been introduced in the General Assembly to make amendments to the Access to Public Records Act specifically relating to online database centralization; and
- WHEREAS, the amendments would require that all records maintained by any public body shall be, within 30 days of receipt by the public body, forwarded to the Department of Administration to be entered into a centralized online database to be maintained under the control of the Department of Administration pursuant to § 38-2-17; and
- WHEREAS, according to Rhode Island General Law § 38-2-2(4) a public record shall mean all documents, papers, letters, maps, books, tapes, photographs, films, sound recordings, magnetic or other tapes, electronic data processing records, computer stored data (including electronic mail messages, except specifically for any electronic mail messages of or to elected officials with or relating to

those they represent and correspondence of or to elected officials in their official capacities), or other material regardless of physical form or characteristics made or received pursuant to law or ordinance or in connection with the transaction of official business by any agency; and

WHEREAS, the many offices and public bodies of the cities and towns in Rhode Island, not to mention all of the State offices and public bodies, receive or produce an immeasurable amount of records on a daily basis; and

WHEREAS, the burden on cities and towns, and State agencies, to send all of these public records to the Department of Administration is just too great.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Council of the Town of Burrillville strongly opposes House Bill 2024 – H 7763 and Senate Bill 2024 – S 2679.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Council of the Town of Burrillville respectfully requests Burrillville legislators, the House Committee on State Government & Elections, the Senate Judiciary Committee, and the Rhode Island cities and towns to oppose House Bill 2024 – H 7763 and Senate Bill 2024 – S 2679.
